1 CODE OF CONDUCT

1.1 DRESS CODE

1.1.1 DRESS CODE ON THE COURSE

With the emphasis on neatness as befits the game of golf:

- Appropriate and recognised golf apparel should be worn
- DGC is a soft spike golf course

1.1.2 DRESS CODE ON THE PRACTICE FACILITIES

- A more relaxed approach may be taken, providing the overall effect is neat and tidy
- Closed shoes must be worn

The Committee and General Manager reserve the right to decide upon the appropriateness of dress and will not hesitate to exercise this right; extremes of dress will not be accepted. Please do not embarrass us or yourself by dressing inappropriately.

1.2. CELL PHONES

Players are requested to ensure that their use does not cause a disturbance to other players and that they do not allow their phone calls to interrupt the flow of play.

1.3. NO PLAY ZONE – PROHIBITED ENTRY

Entry into the No Play Zone to the left of the 17th hole will result in a one stroke penalty.

1.4. UNACCEPTABLE LANGUAGE, ABUSE OF GOLF CLUBS AND DISRESPECT FOR THE COURSE AND PEOPLE

Players will be penalised if they behave in any of the following ways:

- Using unacceptable excessive language
- Abuse of golf clubs or damaging the course by slamming/throwing clubs or equipment
- Being disrespectful of other players, referees, spectators or marshals

1.5. COMMITMENT TO PLAY

Should a player be unable to honour his/her commitment to play at the appointed tee-off time, no-show rounds will be charged for so as to compensate the club for any loss of income, unless on the day, the member has telephoned the pro-shop to notify them that he/she is unable to play.

1.6. DRUG FREE SPORT

A competitor shall not knowingly make use of any drug to enhance their performance. This will result in a disqualification.

1.7. PENALTY FOR BREACH OF CODE (Unless otherwise stated)

First breach: Warning or Committee sanction

Second breach: One stroke penalty

Third breach: General Penalty

Fourth breach or any serious breach: Disqualification

Any breach of the Code of Conduct may also result in a formal disciplinary hearing

2 THE COURSE

LOCAL RULES

The establishment and maintenance of Local Rules to be made by the Captain or Chairperson of Match & Handicap in consultation with the Club Committee. These rules will be published on the notice-board

in the players' foyer and will be available for download from the club website:

3 GENERAL TERMS FOR ALL COMPETITIONS

The Rules of Golf and amendments published by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St Andrews shall apply, together with these Terms, Local Rules and if necessary Temporary Local Rules.

The organisation, control and conduct of all play on the course is vested in the Captain and Club Committee, whose decisions shall be final.

Determinations and decisions dealing with Terms of Competition or establishment and maintenance of Local Rules shall be made by the Captain or Chairperson of Match & Handicap in consultation with the Club Committee. When reasonable, determinations and decisions dealing with Temporary Local Rules, composition of fields, playing of competitions and matches may be made by any member of the Club Committee alone, provided any other members of the Club Committee who are reasonably available are consulted prior to making the decision.

3.1 CONDUCT OF COMPETITION

All competitions shall commence at the 1st or 10th hole unless otherwise advised by the Club Committee.

3.2 WEDNESDAY AND SATURDAY COMPETITIONS

For a Wednesday or Saturday competition to go ahead there must be a field of at least 28 players. A competition may only be cancelled or aborted if the course is declared closed, in which case any *competition fees* paid will be refunded to members' spending accounts.

3.3 COMPETITION PRIZES

No player can win more than one trophy in any event with the exception of the Club Championship and Monthly Medals.

3.4 COMPETITION PRIZE VALUES

Prizes will be paid in the form of vouchers which may be redeemed to members' spending accounts. In the event of a competition being sponsored, then the club reserves the right to award prizes to the values listed below, in the form either of goods or trade vouchers. To take account of variable field sizes Wednesday and Saturday Competition prize fund pools will be distributed according to the size of the field.

Nearest the Pin: R100

Yellow Novelty Ball: Choice of prize at the committee's discretion

3.5 TWO-CLUB COMPETITION

The competition fee, which stands at R55, includes R5 to be pooled to form the prize fund for the Two Club Competition. Thirty percent of the competition fee is held by the club to cover the costs of administering the competition.

All competitors are entered in the Two-Club Competition and the pool will be split equally between those players who complete any hole in two strokes or less.

Players who wish to increase their share of the pool by purchasing additional R5 units for the Two Club Competition may do so.

As a regulation of the club's Wednesday and Saturday competitions, players who are playing off tees of a lower rating than those designated for the club competition and who achieve a Two Club will be paid out at half the rate of that which is being paid out to players playing from the designated tees.

Players who score a Two Club in a Wednesday or Saturday competition must visit the pro-shop before the conclusion of the competition to write their name, their course handicap and the number of the hole where they achieved the feat in the Two Club register. Failure to do so will mean that their Two Club may be overlooked.

3.6 PARTICIPATION OF 'PRIMARY - UNDER 19' MEMBERS IN CLUB COMPETITIONS

Primary members under the age of 19 may join the afternoon competition field on Saturdays provided that:

- 3.6.1 There are available spaces in the field.
- 3.6.2 They are paid-up members of Durbanville Golf Club. That a booking by a Primary Member (Under 19) can only be made on the Friday immediately preceding the Saturday in question; thus allowing all full members a clear thirteen days to make their arrangements for the Saturday.
- 3.6.3 That a junior playing with a parent would not be bound by condition 3.6.2 above. A parent who wished to play with his son or daughter in a Saturday Afternoon field competition will be entitled to book the space in the usual way.
- 3.6.4 That provided a competition fee has been paid, junior players may take part in the competition.

3.6 HANDICAPS - Members

- 3.7.1 The Player's handicap index is displayed by either HNA or such other display item as designated by their Home Club. The handicap index shall be used to determine the course handicap to be played off in a handicap competition.
In accordance with the Rules of Golf, players who are playing a 'different course' to that ruled by the Club Committee as the 'competition course' must adjust their course handicaps for the competition according to the difference in course rating as on the lists available.
- 3.7.2 Handicap indexes should only be altered following review should there be a serious physical limitation causing long-term impairment. There must be a demonstrated inability to play to the assigned handicap index.
- 3.7.3 In all men's events the following handicap index divisions will apply:
 - A Division: up to 8.9
 - B Division 9 – 14.1
 - C Division 14.2 -32.5

In all ladies events the following handicap index divisions will apply:

A Division: Handicap Index 17.3 & Under

B Division: Handicaps Index 17.4 – 28.5

C Division: Handicaps 28.6 – 34.2

3.8 STARTING TIMES

A starting sheet with tee times is located on the touch screen in the M&H Lobby. The General Manager AND THROUGH HIM/HER the Pro-Shop Manager is the designated starter and is responsible for the collection of competition fees and issuing of score cards. Members unable to play at their booked time MUST phone and advise so that this time slot may be re-allocated.

Rule 5.3a, with the exceptions will be enforced. In circumstances that warrant waiving the penalty of disqualification as provided in Exception 3 of Rule 5.3a, see Interpretation 5.3a/1.

3.9 PRIZE-GIVING

- Prize-giving will be held for Wednesday and Saturday afternoon competitions. There will be no prize-giving for Saturday morning fields - prize lists will be posted on the board in the foyer and prizes will be held in the Pro-Shop for up to two weeks following the competition. Prizes not claimed within that period will be forfeited.
- Prize-giving will be held as soon as possible after the prize list has been finalised. It will be preceded by a fifteen-minute warning which will indicate where prize-giving is to be held (upstairs or downstairs) and include the names of the prize winners for the day, so that if available they may attend.
- Prize winners who do not attend prize giving will nevertheless have the opportunity to claim their prize in the same manner as those prize winners in the Saturday morning field.

3.10 PACE OF PLAY GUIDELINES & HALFWAY BREAK

The times given in the table below are the **absolute maximum** allowed for 18 holes. Players who drop behind through lost balls etc. are expected to catch up. A group of four playing a round of 18 holes, with no one impeding them, **should** finish a round in 4 hours 20 minutes (including half way house of 15 minutes) or less. All players in a group are responsible for the pace of play. If a group finishes the round more than the starting interval behind the group in front and over 4h20 minutes from the time of starting, without good reason, all players in the group are subject to a penalty of one stroke.

Break At Half Way: A break of 15 minutes or less for refreshment may be taken after nine holes.

3.11 SCORECARDS - COMMITTEE'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- 3.11.1 To issue a score card for each player containing his/her name, date and type of event. The Committee delegates this responsibility to the player to correctly and clearly fill in the details required on the scorecard.
- 3.11.2 On return of the card by the player, to add up the scores for each hole to arrive at a total for the round and to apply the course handicap recorded on the card. This responsibility is delegated by the committee to the marker of the card. The committee undertakes subsequently to check the scorecard, to verify its accuracy and to confirm that the player's score has been correctly entered on the HNA system.

3.12 WHEN SCORECARD HAS BEEN RETURNED

When card has been handed in at proshop and player has left the proshop. Scorecards needs to be handed in 15 minutes after the round has been completed.

3.13 WHEN THE RESULT OF THE COMPETITION IS FINAL

When the results have been announced. Scorecards needs to be handed in 15 minutes after the round has been completed.

3.14 TIES

In the event of a tie in any competition run by Durbanville Golf Club the following count out system will apply:

Singles - Lowest Handicap Index

Pairs/Alliance – Lowest combined Handicap Indexes

All 18 hole competitions:

3.15 RULES ISSUES & PROTESTS

A player may protect his/ her rights by asking for a ruling in a match under Rule 20.1b. In stroke play, if unsure about the procedure a player may play 2 balls under Rule 20.1c (3). The player have to report this to the committee, otherwise the player is disqualified.

All other protests or claims in connection with a competition or match must be made to the Captain (in his/her absence, the chairperson of Match & Handicap) immediately after the completion of such competition or match. The protest will be considered as early as possible by the Club Committee whose decision shall be final.

3.16 MATCH PLAY EVENTS

Players participating in match play events ARE NOT ELIGIBLE TO PLAY IN THE CLUB EVENT of the day.

See Rule 3.1a

3.17 FOUR BALL EVENTS - SWINGER

Where only three players are available for play in a four ball event (other than an alliance competition), the player with the lowest handicap index may "Swing" with each of the other players forming two teams. If requested by the group, a player other than the lowest handicap index may swing.

3.18 CLOSED EVENTS

Members are advised that ALL SATURDAY EVENTS ARE CLOSED UNLESS NOMINATED AS OPEN OR INVITATION. ("Closed event" means members of Durbanville Golf Club ONLY).

3.19 PROFESSIONAL GOLFERS ELIGIBILITY TO WIN SCRATCH EVENTS

No PGA member is eligible to win a singles scratch event. No PGA member is eligible to win a scratch event in conjunction with the Saturday or Wednesday competition. No visiting PGA member is eligible to win a 2 Ball or 4 Ball scratch event.

3.20 SENIORS' SOCIETY

From the beginning of April until end of September, all players wishing to play are requested to register with the Seniors' Society Duty Secretary prior to 7.30am on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Tee off times will be from 7.30am to 8.30am. From October to March, all players are requested to register with the Seniors' Society Duty Secretary prior to 8.00am. Tee times will be from 7am to 8.30am.

4 COMPETITION FORMATS AND SCORING

4.1 MEDAL EVENTS

In Medal events, the number of strokes taken on each hole is recorded on the score card.

4.2 BOGEY PLUS EVENTS

The gross score is entered on the scorecard as in STROKE play. However, where the score exceeds par for the hole allowing for the course handicap stroke/s, no score need be recorded and a "-" shall be entered in the column beside the score.

Where par has been equalled after allowing for the course handicap stroke/s a "0" shall be entered in the column beside the score. Where par has been bettered after allowing for the course handicap stroke/s a "+" shall be entered in the column beside the score.

At the end of the round the plus and minus signs are added and the net result recorded as so many "pluses", "minuses" or "even".

4.3 STABLEFORD EVENTS

The gross score is entered on the score card as STROKE play. Where par has been bettered by one stroke after allowing for the course handicap stroke/s, three points shall be awarded and entered in the column beside the score. Where par has been bettered by two strokes after allowing for the course handicap stroke/s, four points shall be awarded and so on. Where the score equals par after allowing for the course handicap stroke/s two points shall be awarded and entered in the column beside the score. Where the score is one over par after allowing for the course handicap stroke/s, one point shall be awarded and entered in the column beside the score. However, when the best score possible after allowing for the course handicap stroke/s is two or more over par, the ball should be lifted, no score recorded and a "-" entered in the appropriate column.

4.4 FOUR- BALL EVENTS

All Four-ball events are played by teams of two players each, often in conjunction with the individual or 'singles' competition of the day. Individual nett scores on each hole are calculated according to the format being played and the better of the two individual results for each hole is recorded as the team score. Four- Ball competitions can be played as 4BBB MEDAL, 4BBB PLUS and 4BBB STABLEFORD. *(For details of Four-Ball play, see Rule 23)* **Note:** *In all team events, care must be taken to ensure that the scores being recorded for the team are in separate columns headed by the name & initials of the players so that the committee may identify the player whose score is to count on each hole*

4.4.1 Four Ball Combined Events

Similar to a 4BBB but with the total of both players' nett scores on each hole being scored for the team.

4.4.2 Four Ball Alternate Combined Events

A Four Ball (Two players) event in which the team score recorded is the better of the two individual nett scores on the first 9 holes but the aggregate (total) of the players' individual nett scores on the second 9 holes.

4.4.3 666 EVENTS

A team of two event where the score is the best individual nett score for 6 holes, the sum of the two best individual nett scores for 6 holes and the sum of the individual nett scores for 6 holes. Players must nominate whether they are choosing to multiply, add or take the better individual score before moving on to the next tee box.

4.4.4 FOUR BALL ALLIANCE EVENTS

Teams of 4 compete against the field. Scoring is done according to the relevant format on the day. Should a team be missing a player (3-ball) a Ghost score will be awarded and the card recalculated by the pro shop staff. The Ghost player will be the Captain, Vice-Captain or a committee member playing in the competition.

Formats:

2 Scores to count: Best 2 scores on each hole.

Progressive Alliance: Holes 1-6 (1 score) holes 7 -12 (2 scores) holes 13 – 18 (3 scores)

Captains Alliance: Par 5's (1 score) Par 4's (2 scores) & Par 3's 3 scores)

4.5 FOURSOMES

Two players play as a team but play only one ball. Each player hits off alternate tees with his or her partner playing the next stroke. The players then stroke the ball alternately until the ball is holed. Scoring is as for a Medal round with the nett score calculated by deducting half of the players' combined course handicaps.

4.6 MIXED & MEDLEY COMPETITIONS

4.6.1 MEDLEY - denotes a competition where both men and women golfers may play in the same event in any combination of singles or teams.

4.6.2 MIXED - denotes a competition where both men and women golfers may play in the same event but each team must consist of a man and a woman golfer.

4.7 COLOURED BALL EVENT

In this novelty round, usually played in conjunction with a Single Stableford, each group is given a coloured golf ball and a separate score card.

This ball is used by a player in the group for the first hole and that player's nett score is recorded for the team on the special card. On the second hole, another player in the group plays the ball and his/her nett score is recorded for the team. This sequence is followed until all players in the group have used the ball and recorded the score obtained when using the ball. The ball then passes back to the first player and play continues in this sequence for the 18 holes. If the ball is lost, scoring on the coloured ball card ceases. The team with the best score for a completed card is the winner.

4.8 HANDICAP MATCH PLAY EVENTS

The player with the lowest course handicap plays off scratch. Each of the other players then reduces their course handicap by the amount of the lowest course handicap in the group. For instance, say the course handicaps are: A(7), B(11), C(5) and D(23). The resultant playing course handicaps become A(2), B(6), C(0) and D(18) respectively. Course handicap strokes are taken according to the Stroke Index shown on the score card.

4.9 COMPETITIONS WHERE PLAYERS MUST ARRANGE THEIR OWN MATCHES

In some knockout competitions, such as the Club Match Play and the Winter Knockout players (or 'sides') must arrange their own matches before a set end date. This is usually the last day of a month. It is the responsibility of the first named side to arrange a mutually satisfactory date for their match. In the event that the first named side is unable to contact the other side, arrangements should be made through the Pro-Shop Manager or the General Manager at least two weeks before the end date. It is the further responsibility of the winning side of a match to enter their name into the next round on the draw sheet before the first Saturday in the next month. Any side which has not completed their scheduled match by the set end date and, in the opinion of the Committee, has not made a genuine effort to set a date in a timely fashion or which has not put its name on the draw sheet by the first Saturday of the next month will be disqualified.

5 TERMS OF EVENTS

5.2 CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP - Closed Event

5.1.1 Eligibility:

The tournament is open to any amateur golfer who is a paid up and handicapped member of Durbanville Golf Club. (DGC) A member must have held a valid SAGA/HNA handicap index for the period 1st January till the commencement of the Championships.

Each player can win more than one trophy.

5.1.2 Handicap Limits & Format:

Club Championship for men are played over 72 holes Stroke Play medal. 18 holes per day. Draw to be done by Tournament Committee. Seeded draw to be done for rounds 3 & 4. The Championship in each division is for the best gross score over 72 holes, playing off the markers allocated by the Committee. The Nett Competition may be played off any other tee markers chosen by the player.

Trophy Allocation:

72 hole scratch winners (A, B & C Divisions). 72 hole scratch runners up (A, B & C Divisions).

72 hole nett winners (A, B & C Divisions). 72 hole nett runners up (A, B & C Divisions).

Handicap Index Divisions are as follows:

A: 0 – 8.9 B: 9 – 14.1 C: 14.2 – 32.5

Club Championship for ladies are played over 36 holes Stroke Play medal. 18 holes per day. Draw to be done by Tournament Committee. Seeded draw to be done for 2nd round. The Championship in each division is for the best gross score over 36 holes, playing off the markers allocated by the Committee. The Nett Competition may be played off any other tee markers chosen by the player. A nett trophy is run concurrently. 18 Holes per day.

Handicap Index Divisions:

A Division: Handicap Index 17.3 & Under

B Division: Handicaps Index 17.4 – 28.5

C Division: Handicaps 28.6 – 34.2

Prize Giving will follow play on the last day.

5.1.3. Rules of Golf:

The Rules of Golf as approved by R&A Rules Limited will apply together with the Terms of the Competition and such Local Rules approved by the Tournament Committee.

5.1.4. Tournament Committee:

The Tournament Committee will be appointed by the Committee of DGC and their names will be displayed on the Tournament Notice Board. This committee reserves the right to alter the programme, regulations and conditions of the event at any time, including starting times. All disputes shall be settled by the Tournament Committee whose decision shall be final. Any dispute/protest should be lodged within 15 minutes of completion of the round. This information may be requested in writing.

5.1.5. Entries:

All entries shall be submitted in writing on the appropriate forms by the announced date.

All entry fees payable before the start of the 1st round.

All entries shall be subject to the approval of the Tournament Committee and no entries will be accepted from players whose handicap index have lapsed.

5.1.6. Handicap Index:

Handicap Index as of the first day of play will apply and will be the handicap index that will stay in place for the player for the duration of the Championship. It will determine the division in which a player competes and will be applied to calculate all nett results. It is the responsibility of each competitor to advise the Tournament Committee of their correct handicap index on the first day of play. All scores must be up to date and entered **before midnight** of the day prior to the 1st day of play.

Should a player have a handicap index change, which changes their Division, before the Championship commence, the player must notify the Tournament Committee immediately.

5.1.7. Time of Starting:

A player must report in time to the starter on the applicable Teeing Ground. Rule 5.3a is in effect.

If a player arrives at his starting point within 5 minutes after his/her starting time, the penalty is 2 strokes at the first hole. If he/she arrives more than 5 minutes after the starting time, the player is disqualified, see Exception 3 of Rule 5.3a.

5.1.8. Ties:

In the event of a tie for 1st place, the winner will be determined by a sudden death play-off until a result is achieved. The play-off hole/s will be posted on the Tournament Notice Board. If the playing

of a sudden death play-off or continuation of a sudden death play-off is deemed by the Tournament Committee to be impractical, for any reason, then the trophy will be shared. All other ties will be decided in accordance with the Count-Out procedures laid down in the General Terms of Competitions of DGC.

5.1.9. Caddies:

Rule 10.3a is modified in this way: A player must not have a person who is or has been a member of a professional golf association as a caddie. Persons who have regained their amateur status are not included in this prohibition as his or her caddie during the round.

Penalty for Breach: The player gets the general penalty for each hole during which he or she is helped by such a caddie. If the breach happens or continues between two holes, the player gets the general penalty for the next hole. As soon as the breach is discovered, the caddie **MUST** be removed.

5.1.10. Players with Disabilities:

The Tournament Committee will determine and publish modifications to the rules of golf which will apply to individual disabled players playing in a tournament using the R&A Rules of Golf for Players with Disabilities as a guideline. For such modifications to be considered, a player must be a registered affiliated member of the South African Disabled Golf Association (SADGA) or a governing body recognized by SADGA. Applicants must apply individually to have their case considered by the Tournament Committee.

5.1.11. Score Information:

If requested to do so, players must provide score information to Tournament Officials during the course of play.

5.1.12. Scoring & Results:

A competitor is considered to have returned his/her score card when he/she has left the designated scoring area after his/her score has been entered into the computer or manually accepted by a scorer appointed by the Tournament Committee. The competition is closed when all scores have been validated in the scoring system and approved by the Tournament Committee. In the event of a play-off, the event shall be deemed to have closed when the play-off scores have been approved by the Tournament Committee. Any complaint must be lodged as soon as possible.

5.1.13. Publicity:

DGC and the sponsors of the Championship may arrange publicity before, during and after the Tournament in the press, by live and recorded radio, television and by filming. The competitors assent to references to them and pictures of them at practice and in play appearing and being used for commercial purposes by DGC and their Sponsors.

5.1.14. Weather Delays and Suspension of Play:

The following signals are in force:

Discontinue Play Immediately: One prolonged note of siren.

Discontinue Play: Three consecutive notes of siren, repeated.

Resume Play: Two short notes of siren, repeated.

Rule 5.7 is applicable.

When play is suspended by the Committee for a dangerous situation, if the players in a group are between the play of two holes, they must not resume play until the Committee has ordered a resumption of play. If they are in the process of playing a hole, they must discontinue play immediately and not resume play until the Committee has ordered a resumption of play. If a player

fails to discontinue play immediately, he/she is disqualified, unless circumstances warrant waiving the penalty as provided in Rule 5.7b Exception. The signal for suspending play due to a dangerous situation will be a prolonged note of the siren.

5.1.15. Spectators:

Spectators to keep off tees, fairways and greens at all times and not to interfere with any player. The audible emission of cell phones is not acceptable and cell phones should be switched off. The use of motorized golf cars by spectators are not permitted without the consent of the Tournament Committee. Failure to adhere to such requests could lead to spectators being asked to leave the golf course.

5.1.16. Liability:

DGC does not warrant or guarantee the safety of any person. DGC and its management will not be held responsible for any damages, loss, including personal loss and or other forms of loss, harm or injury sustained as stipulated below:

- Physical and/or emotional injuries suffered during the championship, due to any acts of God, suffered as a direct result thereof, including aspects such as being struck by lightning, etc.
- Physical injuries of any kind suffered by any person, including a player or spectator sustained by own negligence, or otherwise.
- Emotional injuries sustained due to any loss, including death, suffered as a result of any of the above injuries sustained personally or by spectator.
- Damages suffered to any property of a player.

5.1.17. Practice:

Players are permitted to use the practice facility and driving range prior to and in between rounds.

Unless otherwise noted, the penalty for a breach of these Terms is two strokes.

5.2 CLUB MATCHPLAY Medley - Closed Event

- 5.2.1 All events are controlled by the Committee whose decision is final.
- 5.2.2 Any protests must be lodged in writing when the score card(s) is returned.
- 5.2.3 To be eligible to be part of the Club Match play, each member must enter on the sheet provided by the Chairperson of Match & Handicap before the first qualifying round.
- 5.2.4 A draw will operate for this match play competition.
- 5.2.5 All players must be available to play all matches at the time and date specified by the Match & Handicap Committee.
- 5.2.6 A knockout competition, where each match will be played off the course handicap, with the lower course handicap going to scratch.

5.17 SENIOR MEDAL TROPHY Men's Closed Competition

This is a monthly challenge trophy played for concurrently by those men over 60 years of age who have entered the Men's Monthly Medal Competition.

The trophy is played for using the Medal Stableford format. Players play off scratch and score as follows:

Where par has been bettered by one stroke, three points shall be awarded and entered in the column beside the score. Where par has been bettered by two strokes, four points shall be awarded and so on. Where the score equals par, two points shall be awarded and entered in the column beside the score. Where the score is one over par, one point shall be awarded and entered in the column beside the score. However, when the best score possible is two or more over par, a “-“ should be entered in the appropriate column. At the end of the round, Stableford scores should be totalled and added to the player’s course handicap to give the final Medal Stableford score. In the event of a tie the WPGolf approved method of countback shall be used to determine the winner.

6. COURSE CLOSURE

On the advice of the Greens’ Superintendent, the call as to whether to close the course owing to inclement weather will be made by the Captain or in his absence by the General Manager or his/her deputy. Refunds are only allowed once the course has been closed.

6.1 DANGER FROM LIGHTNING

Players need to be aware of the very real danger from lightning to people on a golf course. Where Club officials are made aware of lightning activity in the area, a decision may be made to suspend play. Players will be notified of this by the sounding of a siren using the following code. All players are required under Rule 5.7 to immediately comply with any warnings given and are strongly urged to follow the advice given below.

6.2 SUSPENSION OF PLAY SIREN CODE

- One long blast, repeated once after 30 seconds – Discontinue play immediately
- Three short blasts, repeated once after 30 seconds – Discontinue play
- Two short blasts, repeated once after 30 seconds – Continue play

Players should not rely on the committee to suspend play if they believe that there is a danger from lightning.

PLAYERS SHOULD ACT UNDER RULE 5.7a, WHICH ALLOWS A PLAYER TO DISCONTINUE PLAY IF “HE/SHE BELIEVES THERE IS A DANGER FROM LIGHTNING”.

When a thunderstorm threatens, ideally get inside a home or large building or inside an all metal vehicle (not a golf cart).

6.3 IF THERE IS NO TIME TO REACH A SAFE BUILDING OR A VEHICLE, FOLLOW THESE RULES

1. Do not stand underneath a natural lightning rod such as a tall, isolated tree.
2. Avoid projecting above the surrounding landscape as you would do if you were standing on a hilltop, in the middle of an open fairway, or on a tee surrounded by open water.
3. Get away from tractors and other metal course equipment
4. Get off and away from motorcycles, scooters, golf carts and bicycles. Put down golf clubs.
5. Stay away from wire fences, metal pipes, rails and other metallic objects which could carry lightning to you from some distance away.
6. Avoid standing in small isolated sheds or other small structures in open areas.
7. In the trees, seek shelter in a low area under a thick growth of small trees. In open areas, if possible, go to a low place such as a gully.
8. If in a group, spread out, keeping people several metres apart.
9. If you're hopelessly isolated in a level paddock and you feel your hair stand on end - indicating that lightning is about to strike - drop to your knees and bend forward putting your hands on your knees. Do not lie flat on the ground.

6.4. MAJOR EVENTS AND INCLEMENT WEATHER

Major events or qualifiers for those events should only be called off if the course is closed.
